What is the iPQ?


The ISEB Project Qualification (iPQ) provides a framework for teaching and assessing the development of independent, pupil-led project-learning skills, taking the form of a 15-20 hour-long project. It can be used as a stand-alone addition to an existing curriculum, or as an alternative to one or more curriculum subjects. The iPQ is usually completed in Years 7 or 8, but schools may start preparing pupils for the iPQ through smaller-scale project work in Years 5 or 6.


HOW DOES IT WORK?

Project work is assessed by the teacher and submitted to ISEB for moderation in the form of a record of the project process, the project outcome, and evidence of a final presentation. Projects are collaboratively ranked by a group of judges using cutting-edge technology against set criteria, resulting in a reliable, fair, transparent and highly accurate outcome. Schools are provided with insightful data reports, and pupils are awarded a certificate from ISEB.

LEVELS

- iPQ2** For Years 5 and 6, with a focus on devising and delivering a group project, in collaboration with others.
- iPQ3** For Years 7 and 8, with a focus on independent enquiry.
- iPQ4** For Years 8 and 9, with a focus on leadership, problem-solving, and real-world projects.





Why the iPQ?

Play to pupils' strengths – the iPQ is about the process, not the outcome, so pupils can select topics, investigations, talents, or activities in which they are interested in or excel at. The iPQ is an excellent complement to traditional exams, developing additional skills that add to a child's portfolio of recognised achievements.




The Skills

The iPQ framework takes pupils through five defined learning stages, in which they explore a question and present their findings. The flexibility built into the design gives schools broad scope to fit the project and assessment to their curriculum and pupils' needs.

Embracing independent learning at The Banda School in Nairobi, Kenya

The Banda School adopted the iPQ as a way to embrace independent learning during the first Coronavirus lockdown. After seeing positive results including improved pupil motivation and well-being, and opportunities for teachers to guide individual learning journeys, it became a key part of the curriculum for year 7.

Championing sustainability at Cottlesmore School in West Sussex, UK

The iPQ was first adopted by Cottlesmore School as a leavers project for a group of Year 8 pupils in 2019. It is now completed by all of Years 7 and 8 with a focus on sustainability, encouraging pupils to think widely about how sustainability links to their everyday lives and interests. The school sees the iPQ as a great way to help pupils develop a range of soft skills such as research, teamwork, and public speaking.

Promoting lateral thinking and providing new challenges at Hall Grove School in Surrey, UK

At Hall Grove School pupils complete the iPQ in Year 8, following a preliminary project utilising the iPQ structure in Year 7. Children are encouraged to think widely about their project questions, and greater importance is placed on the process of seeking answers and overcoming challenges rather than on the answers themselves.




HOW TO GET STARTED

Schools can register pupils for the iPQ between September and June. Pupils should be registered in the same academic year in which they will complete the iPQ. Registration is completed on the ISEB website, through the Schools Hub at www.iseb.co.uk/schools. If your school already has an ISEB School Account for the website, you can log in with your existing account to register pupils for the iPQ. If you do not have an account, you can apply for one at www.iseb.co.uk/register.


